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Chair's Statement

Welcome to the UK Public Health Association's Annual Report for April 2007 to March 2008. The past year has been extremely challenging but also rewarding for the UKPHA. Our office move has proved a great success, not only significantly reducing our outgoings but also integrating us more closely with colleagues actively involved in promoting health and tackling the root causes of ill-health.

The UKPHA places a high priority on effective partnership working and throughout the past year, working closely with leading organisations and agencies across all sectors, we have been successful in taking forward crucial work in the areas of climate change/sustainable development and health, and fuel poverty. All of this and more has been achieved despite considerable constraints created by a series of changes within the UKPHA Council.

A conflict of interest issue arose over a member of Council and while it was eventually resolved in accordance with the Executive Group's unanimous recommendation, it involved taking a resolution to Council. Throughout the year, four other trustees also left the Council for various and different reasons. We wish to acknowledge the contribution they made to the work of the Association and were of course very sorry to lose them.

This last year has, however, opened up major opportunities to reposition the UKPHA within the wider public health, as well as rethinking its governance arrangements. Members are being fully consulted on these after which time final decisions will be taken by Council with a view to introducing the new arrangements over the next year. We are therefore confident that we will be able to move forward

with renewed vigour and optimism. That is certainly my fervent wish as Chair and one that is shared by those Council members who are remaining in office for a further year to see these changes through.

Other sections of the report deal in more detail with the highlights over the past year. I want to single out a couple of developments for comment. As noted above, the repositioning of the UKPHA in terms of its strategic direction merits mention. As members know, and as we have been promoting at successive forums and through other means, the Association firmly believes that public health and sustainable development should go hand-in-hand. A great deal of effort has gone into bringing these agendas together with the UKPHA leading on this initiative. But if we are truly to represent the wider public health we need to forge new and different relationships that go well beyond the traditional groupings in public health.

As also mentioned above, we are extremely proud of the work on fuel poverty being taken forward in Salford which is going from strength to strength.

As we look to the future, it promises to be as interesting and challenging as ever. Whatever else confronts us, the Association must be in a position to exploit fully the opportunities that may arise and it is for this reason that Council believes it is time to renew itself.

“A challenging but rewarding year”

Selected Activities and Achievements in 2007-2008

- Funding secured to take forward Salford and Greater Manchester Fuel Poverty Initiative.
- Launch of the Climates & Change document in June following the National Symposium on Health and Sustainable Development on March 2007, setting out key priorities for taking this important work forward.
- Environmental Pollutants SIG changed into Health & Sustainable Environments SIG, designed to reflect and complement the activities of the high level Health & Sustainable Development Action Group seeking implementation of the Climates & Change programme, by giving a forum for the grassroots members of the UKPHA to contribute strongly to the public health/sustainable development process.
- In November 2007, the Regional Directors of Public Health event on Health and Climate Change took place to take forward one of the priority actions from the Climates & Change document.
- The Chair and Chief Executive presented at a number of events, seminars and conferences, and participated in various radio broadcasts.
- The Chair continued to participate actively in the Department of Health Public Health Leadership Group and contributed to the Public Health Expert Reference Group of the Healthcare Commission and the Health Inequalities Expert Group at the Department of Health.
- PHA Cymru co-hosted the Health and Housing Symposium in collaboration with CIH Cymru in September and in November co-sponsored the 5th All Wales Health and Wellbeing Congress held in Cardiff with the All Wales Wellbeing NGO Network.
- UKPHA Scotland held a seminar in June 2007 in Stirling in partnership with the Sustainable Scotland Network (SSN) and the Scottish Forum for Public Health (SFPH) – Public Health and Sustainable Development: getting it together. Then in February 2008, with

Community Health Exchange (CHEX), Voluntary Health Scotland (VHS), and Community Food and Health Scotland (CFHS), ran an information stall at the Scottish Parliament in February to help raise awareness amongst MSPs of the work of the four organisations and of our key public health issues.

- All Trustees and SIG Chairs have written and contributed to articles published in many and varied publications.
- The Devolution StIG has been successful in getting a grant from the Nuffield Trust to arrange a Round Table discussion in the summer involving all those from around the UK and Ireland who are doing work in the area of learning from difference.
- Health Visiting SIG held a Parliamentary Symposium on the regeneration of the health visiting service in October 2007.
- In February 2008 the Food SIG and the IDeA held a round table event on childhood obesity.
- Pharmacy SIG relaunched in September 2007 and membership continues to grow.
- The Treasurer and Chief Executive attended the American Public Health Association's Annual Meeting in Washington DC.
- UKPHA responded to many consultations on public health at a national level.
- UKPHA met with a delegation from Nigeria, advising them on how we, as a voluntary body, develop our membership base and how we impact on the national and local public health agendas.
- The Chief Executive attended the World Federation of Public Health Associations Annual conference in Geneva in May 2007.

“A challenging but rewarding year”

2007-2008 has certainly been a seminal year for the UKPHA. Following on from the important work developed during 2006/2007 and culminating in the National Symposium on Health and Sustainable Development in March 2007 the UKPHA has been riding the wave of the ever increasing public and political awareness of the urgent need to address the threats to public health from climate change and environmental degradation.

As a direct outcome of the Symposium the Health and Sustainable Development Action Group was formed comprising experts and key players from across the UK and in June 2007 the important work *Climates and Change - the urgent need to connect health and sustainable development* was published.

This set the scene for the action priorities which formed the basis of key elements of the UKPHA's work throughout 2007/2008.

The most significant of these has been the national event for Regional Directors of Public Health from which a regionally based work plan has been agreed based on collaborative cross-sectoral partnerships as well as environmental stewardship and carbon reduction within the NHS.

This work was further developed at the UKPHA's 16th Annual Public Health Forum in Liverpool when major leaders from across the social economic and environmental fields joined with the Health and Sustainable Development Action Group and the Regional Director's of Public Health Group to involve delegates in taking the work forward.

A further major initiative rooted in the principles of sustainable development is the Salford and Greater Manchester Fuel Poverty Initiative which is a direct out come of the work of the Health Housing and Fuel Poverty Forum which the UKPHA has hosted and coordinated over the last three years. This work is a major partnership collaboration between the UKPHA, Salford City Council, Salford PCT

and the Association of Greater Manchester Authorities. Jointly funded by all of these partners and by the Department of Health this work will tackle head-on the root causes of health inequalities caused by fuel poverty and will give a national lead to future policy development in this area.

As ever the Chairs and members of our Special Interest Groups work tirelessly to push out the boundaries of thinking and policy development in Pharmacy and Public Health, Food and Nutrition, Health Visiting and Public Health and Health & Sustainable Environments - always with a specific focus on addressing health inequalities. Despite our extremely limited resources these SIGs have been very influential in determining the policy agenda responding to consultations and holding key events and symposia involving leading activists, networks and policy makers, as reviewed in depth later in this Report.

The office move in November took a considerable amount of planning and time but we are delighted to be in our new premises where we can work much more effectively with our ‘landlords’ the Child Poverty Action Group, Sustain and the Food Commission.

Of course none of this would be possible without the dedicated support of our full-time and sessional staff who always go the extra mile and manage to get a quart out of a pint pot!

Special thanks go to Sarah Persaud, our PA/Administrator who has been heroic and unstinting during very turbulent times, Lesley Rowlings our Finance Officer who has made a major contribution to rationalising our financial management systems and of course to Donald Reid of Annual Forum fame who masterminds the intricacies of conference programme planning!

Salford and Greater Manchester Fuel Poverty Initiative

In November 2007 the UKPHA was successful in gaining funding from the Department of Health, Salford City Council, Salford PCT and the Association of Greater Manchester Authorities (AGMA) for this crucially important work which will be pioneered in Salford. In March 2008, the Project Manager was appointed.

The focus of this initiative which will run from April 2008 to March 2010 is to provide a tested, long-term and fully sustainable approach to significantly reducing, and eventually eliminating health inequalities across the nation caused or exaggerated by poor housing and fuel poverty.

It facilitates a fundamental, far-reaching review of how all Local Authorities, PCTs, energy suppliers and other partners can work together to deliver a variety of integrated, cost-effective interventions that successfully reach the most vulnerable households. It offers real, workable opportunity to break permanently the poor housing/fuel poverty/ill-health trap of vulnerable households throughout the country. It will:

- break down barriers to effective information sharing and partnership working at all levels and across all disciplines;
- facilitate the development of strategies and policies in an open, inclusive manner that promotes ownership of agreed priorities by all partners;

- support the development of long-term strategic relationships based on partnering frameworks that deliver relevant, positive outcomes for each partner, realise cost savings, enhance efficiency and extend outreach;
- reduce reliance on short-term funding programmes with competitive bidding exercises that divert staffing resources from service delivery;
- demonstrate how the approach supports more effective use existing resources and attracts additional funding to this policy area, as it demonstrated the long term health and social benefits of relatively modest investment in energy efficiency improvements;
- capture all learning from this project to create a flexible , fit for purpose’ model that can be adapted and adopted to address the needs of a range of areas to direct the more effective use of existing mainstream resources
- promote the ‘fit for purpose’ model to LAs and PCTs via existing regional and sub-regional structures

This work will address the numerous health inequalities associated with impoverished living conditions and takes forward the UKPHA coordinated Health, Housing and Fuel Poverty Forum initiative which showed conclusively:

“...health staff are willing to refer clients but find the array of organisations involved in delivery confusing, and the language baffling; they want to refer clients simply, quickly and be assured they will receive appropriate, practical help”.

The Health and Sustainable Development Action Group

The Health and Sustainable Development Action Group which grew from the Edinburgh Symposium in March 2007 goes from strength to strength.

The Group met regularly throughout 2007/2008 and focused mainly upon the prioritised work with the Regional Directors of Public Health (RDsPH) in England. It was agreed that the Group would work with the RDsPH with a view to having a major meeting identifying key areas of progress within the Regions, which could be drawn together to exemplify the joined-up working and localised action which form the foundations of sustainable development. The aim of the meeting was to facilitate and inspire the regional public health community in taking a leading role in developing and implementing good practice for sustainable development in the governance of their regions.

The national event took place in November 2007 and three main action priorities were agreed:

- The raising of political and public awareness and active lobbying on the need for ‘joined-up’ government policy and practice crucial to the underpinning of a healthy sustainable society
- NHS Stewardship – Leading by Example – action within and across the NHS to reduce the carbon footprint, minimise environmental impact, the creation of healthy workplaces and patient and community empowerment
- Regionally led health and sustainable development initiatives based on collaborative regional partnerships which will deliver housing, planning, transport, food production and employment decisions which will actively promote healthy sustainable communities

This work took pride of place at the UKPHA’s 16th Annual Public Health Forum featuring in the Opening Plenary, the High Level Workshop and in the Concurrent Debates.

Food and Nutrition Special Interest Group

The Food SIG is a network of informed public health practitioners and activists that aims to:

- Promote and develop nutritional wellbeing across the population
- Decrease inequalities in terms of food access, food knowledge and food choice
- Promote sustainable food production and agricultural practices

The main focus of the Food and Nutrition group has been the challenge of obesity. We had a lively discussion at the 2007 Public Health Forum in Edinburgh led by three experts - Prof Tim Lang (City University), Liam Hughes (IDeA) and Francis Bains (Sustrans). The speakers highlighted the need for more radical and co-ordinated efforts by stakeholders at all levels if we are to halt the obesity epidemic. We had a joint event, in February 2008, with IDeA (the Improvement and Development Agency) focusing on childhood obesity. At this event participants considered the strengths and weaknesses of the Obesity Strategy and the NICE guidance to local authorities. The outcomes from the day informed our discussions at Annual Forum in Liverpool.

The Food SIG has 70 members, whose meetings are mainly held by teleconference during lunch times, rather than face-to-face. As well as planning for the Forum and our other events, these meetings also include discussion on grassroots topics such as the nutritional status of vulnerable groups such as asylum seekers, refugees and the elderly and food and nutrition work being delivered by staff without any public health, nutrition or community dietetics background.

Lastly but not the least I would like to thank all members who have responded to consultations on behalf of the SIG and in particular, to Elizabeth Dowler, Geoff Rayner and Angela Mawle who along with me met the Cabinet Strategy Unit to discuss the Food Strategy. A special thanks to Modi Mwatsama for arranging the offsite visit at the Forum on behalf of the SIG.

We look forward to an equally busy year in 2008/09.

Health Visiting Special Interest Group

The Health Visiting and Public Health SIG seeks to develop and promote an understanding of the vital roles that health visiting and related professions play in promoting, protecting and improving the public's health. More specifically, we aim to:

- Focus on the UKPHA's key priorities (combating health inequalities, promoting sustainable development and combatting anti-health forces)
- Raise awareness of the breadth and fluidity of health visiting and related roles and the way that these professionals work to improve the health of all communities
- Lobby for wider recognition of the vital role that health visitors and related professionals play in delivering current and future public health and community initiatives
- Support the development of a clear evidence base to demonstrate the health impacts of health visiting and related professions

The group has again had an active year, including: publishing a position statement on Health Visiting and Public Health; attending a parliamentary update on the Nappy Study "Tackling diarrhoea and vomiting in children"; finalising a response to the recent Health Visiting Review, "Facing the Future"; and we are currently preparing a position paper on School Nursing. In October 2007, the UKPHA supported a major symposium hosted by Barry Gardiner MP, to discuss the need for a universal health visiting service and the barriers to delivering this, at which, both myself and Angela Mawle spoke.

Into the future, two projects have been developed and submitted for funding - one led by Brenda Griffiths in Bolton drawing on a social marketing initiative, and one to help fund a process of regeneration for the service, practice and profession of health visiting. This breadth and depth of activity ensured lively discussion at the 16th Annual Public Health Forum.

Chair: Professor Sarah Cowley, Kings College, London

The Devolution Strategic Interest Group is made up of a relatively small number of representatives from across the nations of the UK and Ireland. Its mission is to promote the dissemination of information about the ongoing development of public health policy, practice and structures of the four countries in the United Kingdom, and of the Republic of Ireland with a view to determining the utility of different approaches through comparative analysis.

Following on from two early reports, one of which compared public health in the five countries, and the second of which focussed on one of the major public health problems of the 21st century - overnutrition and obesity – we are now looking at transport and health across the five jurisdictions. Dr Stephen Watkins, Chair of the Transport and Health Study Group, has contributed very helpfully to this, based on his long experience and expertise in this area. As in previous years, we presented our work at the Annual Forum – this time in Liverpool.

Forward plans include arranging a Round Table discussion in the summer, to involve all those group and individuals from around the UK and Ireland who are doing work in the area of learning from difference. The aim of the event will be to try to coordinate activities and research to avoid duplication and to promote collaborative working where appropriate. We are grateful to the Nuffield Trust which is providing grant funding for this event.

We would not be able to undertake this work were it not for the energy and enthusiasm of our members, who “meet” through monthly teleconferences, and I would like to thank them for their time and commitment. Health and Sustainable Environments Special Interest Group

The Health and Sustainable Environments SIG (formerly The Health Impacts of Environmental Pollutants and Chemicals SIG) aims to promote through its work:

- equity - of access to green space, good air quality and renewable energy; a safe environment; mobility and transport; clean, safe land and water; flood-proof neighbourhoods
- community-based provision - of space to grow food; minimum waste and efficient recycling
- biodiversity
- changes in agricultural practices and rural land management
- a political framework to protect health, and an audit of the health impacts of environments; better planning processes to help enhance sustainability and health; better planned responses to emergencies

The new focus combines the pollution aspects of the previous SIG with a wider interest in the planning issues affecting the natural and built environments, which often control both the emissions of and our exposure to pollution. The new SIG also has a role in balancing the high level policy focus of the Health and Sustainable Development Action Group by dealing with broad environmental aspects of the sustainable development agenda at the general membership level.

So the group welcomes any UKPHA member who has an interest in these issues, or in what we might describe – following the 2007 Forum – ecological public health.

One of the initial tasks of the SIG is the preparation of a guidebook to local government planning processes and strategies. The guide will show PCTs the wide range of activities that they can be involved in to try and integrate public health more securely into local decision making processes. The guidebook will also provide details of relevant documents and good practice examples.

In parallel to this, the SIG is also working with the Royal Town Planning Institute (RTPI) to provide advice on a good practice note on public health for planners, which will help brief both sides in the Health and Planning relationship. This work informed our session at the Liverpool Forum which explored how to make non-financial factors such as health and environment play a more significant role within local and national decision making.

Pharmacy Special Interest Group

The Pharmacy SIG is a network of informed practitioners that aims to raise awareness of the key issues surrounding pharmacy public health. The group promotes the development of pharmacy public health practice in the UK in order to improve health and reduce health inequalities.

The public health strategy Choosing Health Through Pharmacy (CHTP) is a ten year programme designed to help the pharmacy profession deliver on the wider public health strategy Choosing Health. The document states that there is a need ‘to strengthen the undergraduate pharmacy curriculum and training to support staff to better encompass public health’. However the SIG noted that there is currently no clear guidance about what should be taught to undergraduates in the Royal Pharmaceutical Society (RPS) Accreditation or indicative syllabus documents. So the UKPHA SIG surveyed 24 UK schools of pharmacy.

The aim was to map the current provision of public health teaching, measure resources used, describe course topics currently taught and to differentiate between what should be taught to undergraduates and what is more appropriate at postgraduate level.

The results show a wide variation in terms of hours allocated, methods of delivery and who does the teaching. Public health teaching is

delivered mostly by pharmacists, and we found that only two schools are currently basing their curriculum design on the ten key areas of public health practice devised by the Faculty of Public Health, while five are taking fewer than half of the topics. The results of the survey have been fed into the RPS review of undergraduate education, Fit for the Future and to the Department of Health. Respondents from the schools of pharmacy agreed that it would be helpful to have more guidance from the RPS on what the scope of teaching public health should be.

Membership of the Pharmacy SIG has recently grown, and in particular we have made links with pharmacists in primary care practice. We provide UKPHA representation on the Department of Health Public Health Leadership Forum for Pharmacy, a group which oversees the delivery of Choosing Health Through Pharmacy; we contributed to the UKPHA response to the Health Select Committee on Health Inequalities; and we are also working with the Men's Health Forum on their project about men's health and use of pharmacy.

This range of activity enabled us to engage in lively debate when we reported back at the 16th Annual Public Health Forum in Liverpool.

Chair: Jill Jesson

The three years since the election of the current UKPHA Council have been very turbulent and have also marked rapidly changing attitudes within society to the concept and practice of public health.

This volatile and challenging environment has led to an in-depth scrutiny by the UKPHA Council of the role and function of the UKPHA.

Clearly, now more than ever there is an urgent need for the cross-boundary multi-disciplinary approach to public health in which all factors and players are acknowledged and engaged in working together to create healthy sustainable communities.

It is therefore crucial that the UKPHA Council and membership are fully able to represent this wide constituency and take forward the work in such a way as to ensure that the voice of public health is heard at the highest levels throughout the UK. To achieve this outcome, a thorough review of governance and the representative role of Trustees within the UKPHA has been undertaken. These new governance arrangements were finalised at the Council meeting on 5th March and circulated to members for discussion and agreement at the AGM on 31st March.
